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#### Counting down to 150: Lansing outlines plans to mark big birthday

City gets rolling on campaign to celebrate sesquicentennial

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Lansing started the march Tuesday toward its 150th birthday in 2009 with an 1860s gun salute from the front porch of the Turner-Dodge House.

Mayor Virg Bernero and leaders of the Rotary Club of Lansing, which will lead the sesquicentennial effort, outlined the celebration. It likely will cost more than \$1 million, all from donations.

"I hope everybody will get involved," Bernero said. "So far, we've had a great response on the part of businesses, individuals, and civic organizations."

Officials are planning a series of events throughout 2009, including adding 150th anniversary tie-ins to existing city events such as Silver Bells in the City.

The newly formed Lansing Sesquicentennial Foundation will lead fundraising efforts. Sesquicentennial events are likely to cost at least \$500,000, said Irv Nichols, who chairs the efforts fundraising committee. A gift to the city could add another \$500,000.


